


WE ARE HAPPY WITH JULIA FREUND!



On the occasion of the half-decade "Anabaptist Commemoration 500 Years. Daring!", which commemorates the first adult baptism within the Anabaptist movement in 1525, we plan to engage Dr. Astrid von Schlachta - a proven expert on early modern history from an Anabaptist perspective - to teach at the ATF for the next five years, beginning as early as the upcoming summer semester. We are currently seeking to establish a position (50% research assistant, for an initial five years). This is to be made possible through foundations, congregations, and individuals.



SUMMER SEMESTER 2021

ASTRID VON SCHLACHTA

BETWEEN MARTYRDOM AND ENTREPRENEURSHIP. THE HISTORY OF ANABAPTISTS IN THE EARLY MODERN PERIOD

This seminar focuses on the history of Anabaptist communities in the early modern period and in the 19th century. Stigmatized and criminalized in the 16th century, Anabaptists were initially unable to found lasting communities. Their faith was punishable by death and martyrdom followed. The spectrum of Anabaptists the Mennonites and the Hutterites, as well as the Amish group and Neo-Anabaptist communities that formed later. The seminar shows the political, legal and social framework of Anabaptist existence and raises questions about the toleration of denominationally deviant subjects. The legally and politically extremely ambivalent position of these groups will be examined. The course will be structured by introductory lectures, source exercises and the elaboration of secondary literature. The seminar takes place as an online event.



JUST PEACE - DIETRICH BONHOEFFER'S CONTRIBUTION TO AN ECUMENICAL THEOLOGY OF PEACE

Hardly any German-speaking theologian of the 20th century is as well known as Dietrich Bonhoeffer (1906-1945). Theological reflection and existence, faith and life are closely related to each other in his work. His political resistance against the National Socialist regime, his inner-church resistance against the German Christians, and his commitment to Jews ultimately led to his martyrdom shortly before the end of World War II.

The creativity of his theological thinking cannot be explained without his manifold ecumenical relations. In his relevant lectures in the context of the ecumenical movement, he unfolds approaches to a theologically coherent and ecclesiologically grounded ecumenical peace ethic in view of the burning questions about the nature and mission of the international ecumenical community, which offer orientation up to the present discussions about a "Just Peace".

This week-end seminar will focus in particular on contemporary research approaches. Today, for example, postcolonial and critical reflections on racism shed new light on Bonhoeffer. On the 75th anniversary of the commemoration of Bonhoeffer's murder, several publications on his life and work have appeared, which will also be examined.



SUMMER SEMESTER 2021

EMSTM - EUROPEAN MENNONITE STUDENTS OF THEOLOGY MEETING TOLERANCE, POWER AND IDENTITY: EXCLUSION AND EMBRACE FROM A MENNONITE PERSPECTIVE.

Mennonite theology students and doctoral students from all over Europe (and those who sympathize with them) are invited each spring to deepen theology from a Mennonite perspective. In addition, there is an opportunity to exchange experiences and to support each other in questions of study. These meetings are usually also attended by several visiting Mennonite students from other countries when they are in Europe. - This year the focus will be on the challenging topic of "tolerance". Lecturers from Mennonite Seminary Amsterdam will contribute from Mennonite history and theology/ethics, Bible studies will ask questions of the sources. Against this background, current practical, socially relevant questions will be discussed.

DOES SUFFERING HAVE MEANING?

The question of theodicy in a comparison of religions

The question of suffering remains a fundamental question of religions. Bertrand Russell, the atheistic mathematician and philosopher, once asked: Imagine you were omnipotent and could intervene in everything wouldn't the world look different then? Most people would probably affirm without much hesitation. If they were omnipotent, they would intervene and prevent at least the most terrible misfortune and suffering. Many religious traditions proclaim a message consisting in the promise that existence has a meaning. If this promise is not to remain merely an empty assertion, they must find answers to the question of what the meaning of suffering is. The answers of the various religions could hardly be more diverse. In the seminar we will look at the views from Christian, Jewish, Islamic, Hindu and Buddhist perspectives.

SUMMER SCHOOL, SEPTEMBER 2020


CONSTRUCTION AND POWER OF NARRATIVES IN CONFLICT-LOADED SOCIETIES - POLARIZATION AND/OR TRANSFORMATION

Cooperation of the Interdisciplinary Research Group on Peacebuliding (University of Hamburg) and the Amsterdam, Center for Religion and Peace & Justice Studies (Vrije Universiteit Amsterdam)

Can a Summer School as a special place of learning also function digitally? Our first digital Summer School began with this question and some apprehension. For one week, the group of students from Amsterdam and Hamburg worked intensively on the topic of narratives and their power to shape identities, to exclude people, but also on their potential to create peace.

Even though it was noted that especially the personal encounter was missing as an important part of the Summer School, the Summer School 2020 was a complete success. At the end of the week, the participants said goodbye with the feeling of having spent a very intensive time, which brought many enriching discussions, the space for personal reflections and creative engagement with the topic.

Particularly impressive was a digital visit to the Amsterdam Tropical Museum, which made it very clear how intertwined we are in our diversity through our (family) histories. Also watching videos about "the power of narratives", which were produced as a group work by the participants formed the conclusion of the week, made a deep impression on me and made me think back to this time frequently even after the conclusion of the Summer School.

International Network "Reconciliation Research", November 2020

For the second year in a row, ATF was privileged to host the annual meeting of the interdisciplinary research network. We would have loved to host participants again at the Hamburg Mennonite Church, but unfortunately we had to switch to a digital format. We were surprised how international the group has become through this format and how many new participants were präsent. There were exciting presentations on the psychological aspects of conflict, on the effects of Apartheid in South Africa, or on the impressive reconciliation work in the Middle East and North Africa. - We will be part of next year's meeting again with the ATF, which will then be hosted by the University of Jena.


MENNOFORUM 2020/21

On October 3, 2020, the thirtieth anniversary of German unity, the exhibition "Mennonites in the GDR," prepared by Bernhard Thiessen, was launched in Hamburg and the accompanying exhibition catalog was presented. In the evening, a lively roundtable discussion, composed of contemporary witnesses and researchers of Mennonite history in the GDR, was held.

Unfortunately, the other three mennoFORA planned for the winter had to be cancelled due to COVID-19 restrictions.

Symposium "Anabaptist Commemoration, 500 Years. Daring!", October 2020

Together with the Society of Free Church Theology and Journalism (GFTP), ATF and the Mennonite Historical Society (MGV) organized a symposium as part of the opening of the "Pentade" (five years) "Anabaptist Commemoration, 500 Years. Daring!" under the 2020 annual theme: "Religious Freedom." Specialized presentations from different temporal and geographical perspectives stimulated discussion. They will be published in the annual volume of GFTP 2021.


World Council of Churches, "Hate Speech and Whiteness" webinar, October 2020
