Nonviolence as a Non-Conformist Lifestyle - put to the Test!

For many Christians of the Anabaptist churches, especially those from the Historic Peace Churches, the nonviolence taught by Jesus means refraining from military service, renouncing revenge, and responding to persecutors and wrongdoers solely with nonviolent action. In view of the current global events, this "non-conformist way of life" is a salutary challenge, especially its concrete practice of faith. When, if not now, is the time to inquire about the indispensable Christian witness for peace? At the joint symposium, the biblical foundations and spiritual sources for the Christian peace witness will be examined.

The symposium is supported by a unique collaboration of various institutions and initiatives within the Anabaptist spectrum, the universities of Hamburg and Oldenburg, the Mennonite Historical Society, and the Museum for Russian-German Cultural History. The international and interdisciplinary orientation will broaden and enrich the discussion.
