




We say goodbye to: Ntiimi Mwakalambo

The ATF becomes more diverse! As of fall 2021, PD Dr. Astrid von Schlachta will strengthen the ATF with an academic position (50%) on Anabaptist and Mennonite history. In time for the Anabaptist commemoration in 2025, Anabaptist and Mennonite history will once again be taught at a German university - and for the first time in a specialized academic position. We sincerely thank all those who are contributing to the funding.

In the future, new fields and previously unknown aspects and episodes of Anabaptist and Mennonite history will be prepared and presented in teaching and research. For those interested outside the university spectrum, Astrid von Schlachta will offer a regular Zoom course beginning in the coming winter semester.

In the five-year course "Dared? 500 Years of Anabaptists," Anabaptist and Mennonite history will be explored in depth and developed through source and literature studies in its full breadth and significance to the present day.

The Power of Language - War and Peace in the Mirror of Text and Image.

The seminar will be scheduled as a digital event and as a block seminar. If the development allows it, the event can be held in presence or hybrid, if necessary. Vaclav Havel, Czech dissident and from 1989 President of the Czech Republic, assumed that all important events in the real world, the beautiful as well as the monstrous, always have their prelude in the sphere of words and language. Language has power; language constructs reality and shapes the climate in a society. The seminar examines across epochs how language as word and image has been used in different situations and conflicts within churches and religious groups and how action and reaction are reflected in it. On this basis, we will use texts and art to examine which religious and theological patterns of argumentation shaped the respective times and whether the conflicting parties were able to develop solutions for peaceful coexistence.

"Decolonizing Christology."

Insights from postcolonial studies are changing our entire perception and hermeneutics. The entanglements in the colonial history of violence, accompanied by oppression, slave trade, racism, exploitation of land, and much more, still have an effect - according to the thesis of postcolonial studies. Theologians from former colonies analyze the still existing economic dependencies, foreign attributions and self-perceptions; theologians from former colonizing contexts hesitantly begin to reflect on their white supremacy and to ask (self-) critical questions regarding their worldview and their scientific theories influenced by it.

In the seminar we want to turn to newer approaches to Christology, especially non-European designs. Interpretations of the incarnation, the life and teaching of Jesus, his death on the cross and the resurrection are the main classical topics.

"Justice, Peace, Integrity of Creation" - Peace Theology Ecumenically

In the history of the churches, questions about war and peace have been posed differently in each case, depending on the respective position of the church in society.

With this seminar we want to offer for the first time a "Basic Course in Ecumenical Peace Theology". A number of key themes will guide this course: Nonviolence, military intervention, revolutionary violence, political resistance, human rights, economic globalization, climate justice, cultural diversity, transformative spirituality - to name a few. Each topic is introduced theologically and contextualized historically. Source texts from different centuries, ecclesiological and ethical implications will be highlighted. - The entire team of the ATF will conduct this seminar together.

Tolerance, Power and Identity: Exclusion and Embrace from a Mennonite Perspective.


The week after Easter, Mennonite theology students, doctoral students and faculty in Europe gathered for their annual meeting. Contrary to the name, our community was not only European, but also consisted of people coming from North and South America and Southeast Asia. The theme of our conference was Tolerance, Power and Identity from a Mennonite perspective. In addition to historical reflections, we also addressed current questions.

How is tolerance rooted in our faith and where does it show up in practice? Or are we only tolerant because we are members of the state in which we live and thus want to avoid conflict? On the contrary, isn't tolerance precisely a way of dealing constructively with conflicts and differences of opinion? In any case, we must distinguish between the person and their deeds and opinions. The person always remains an image of God, while different opinions and actions can be criticized. But where can we draw the line between what is tolerable and what is to be rejected? Is the standard found in the Bible (and which parts of the Bible exactly), in our Mennonite identity, or in what we understand to be the center and core of our faith? Is tolerance simply acquiescence or does it require engagement with the other by whom I allow myself to be challenged? - Towards the end, we were surprised to discover that despite the travel restrictions, a genuine sense of togetherness was able to emerge in the digital space, and a real sense of community emerged. RETROSPECT SUMMER 2021

Formatio Mennonitica 2021: Just Peace -Dietrich Bonhoeffer's Contribution to an Ecumenical Theology of Peace.

"For peace must be dared, is the one great venture, and can never, ever be secured." We encountered this phrase from Dietrich Bonhoeffer again and again in our block seminar this year, in which we and about 40 students explored Bonhoeffer and his theology of peace and thoughts on ecumenism. Working on Bonhoeffer's biography made it all the more clear how remarkable his theology of peace is for us today, given the circumstances of life under National Socialism, war and dictatorship. Although the seminar could only take place in digital form this year, two intensive weekends took place in which we not only dealt with Bonhoeffer's ethics and theology in the context of his time, but also reflected on what his demands for daring peace and justice could mean as a form of resistance for the church today. Menno Simons Sermon Prize 2021 goes to Daniel Kaiser (Hamburg)

ATF awards this year's Menno Simons Sermon Prize to the head of the cultural editorial department of NDR 90.3, Daniel Kaiser. The award-winning sermon, delivered on Palm Sunday (April 5, 2020) in the service of the Mennonite Church Hamburg-Altona on "The Anointing in Bethany" (Mark's Gospel 14:3-9), captivates with its clear, unambiguous language without flattening the content. Kaiser does an excellent job of transposing this story into the present context of the Corona pandemic. Moralizing considerations recede into the background when the question of immediate needs is allowed to arise: What is needed here? Who needs what here? - Compassion, attention, tenderness, Jesus here becomes the "Christ" (i.e. the anointed one). "For there, where we waste ourselves, where we give ourselves away, precisely there in this precious moment, heaven and earth touch", concludes the homily. Award ceremony: Sept. 26, 2021, 10 a.m. in the worship service of the Mennonite Church Hamburg-Altona.





